Tom Rees is a 34 year old final year medical student in London. Until six years ago he was better known as an England international rugby player having played in the U16, U18, U19, Sevens and Saxons sides and with 15 full England caps between 2007 and 2008, he was tipped as a future captain. He played 113 games for Wasps in nine injury-plagued years before he was forced to retire from rugby after sustaining a knee injury in March 2012.

Tom is now coming to the end of his medical training at Imperial Medical College. This has enabled him to do a challenging job, which he is as passionate about as rugby - one that can also give as much satisfaction and fulfilment.
